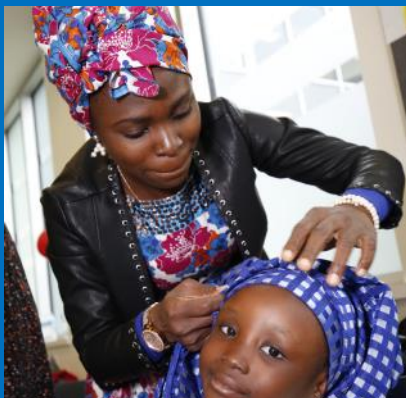

Using historic photographs, this building was reconstructed to duplicate the original Royal Northwest Mounted Police Post, located in Beaver City in 1914-1915. Built using traditional construction methods, comprising of hand-hewn log walls, rough-cut lumber floor boards, and containing local, regional, and national artifacts, this 16 x 24 Post brings the past to life. The Royal Northwest Mounted Police Post Museum is located at the Creighton Recreation Culture & Tourism Center at 216 Creighton Avenue and is a seasonal museum that is open in the summer months.

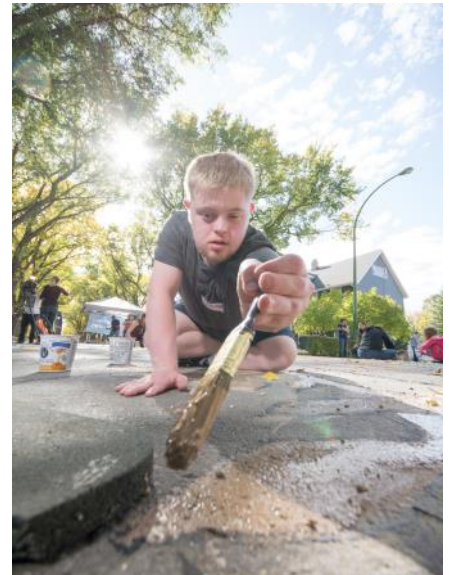

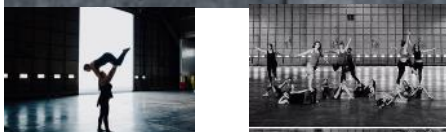

Inspired by the actions of Janice Keil, an Ontarian settler descendant, who in 2017 repatriated 100 acres of her land to the Alderville First Nations, this project will use tactics of civic engagement to correct the wrongful pillage of the land by colonial structures and return it to the original land custodians. The idea of the intervention is to generate conversations and discussions on current issues and to find alternative solutions that promote decolonization, correcting historic actions and questioning the relationship between the land and the concepts of ownership.

This group formed out of a need to share their voices, words, struggles and triumphs as Indigenous people from different backgrounds and common histories. Their poems reflect a history of oppression and pride in their identities – a sense of hopelessness combined with a need to survive, revitalize and flourish. They do this for those who can't or won't use their voice to speak truths. Their bodies are their instruments in creating spaces for the voices of our ancestors and of our future generations.

White Museum is part of SEND ME SKY, Rosa Barba's new exhibition at Remai Modern. The piece is a delicate gesture that showcases the communal intent of cinema, reaching out to the cinematic space beyond the screen.

However, when you open This door you will discover an augmented version of the other side, and each time you close and re-open the door a different experience awaits, utilizing cameras and custom animation to create an augmented reality. The technology allows users to interact with the experience in real-time, individually or in groups.

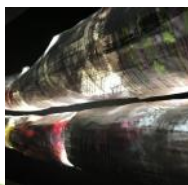

DRONE life 1.0 is a collaborative art installation between Vancouver artists Monique Motut-Firth and Jayson Woolvett involving a one-minute digital loop projection that experiments with animating a machine-like paper collage and wheat-pasting images of other drone-like collages around the city centre. Inspired by the current Cold War political environment and the ongoing threat of nuclear war, these mechanical structures return the gaze of capitalist image consumption towards the audience and survey the social space; the viewer is now the one being observed.

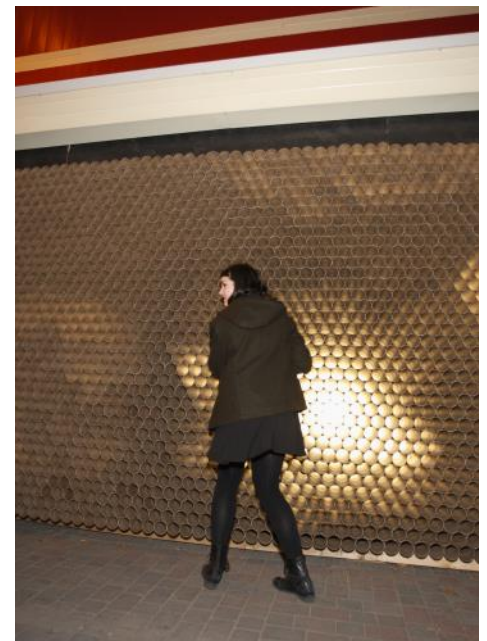
