Métis Beadwork Design with Phyllis Poitras–Jarrett

WHAT WE ARE MAKING TODAY

Métis beadwork is a very identifiable artistic expression that has evolved over many years as part of the Métis culture.

The design is based on symmetry – both sides of the design mirror each

other in colour and design.

Today, Phyllis Poitras-Jarrett will lead you through the steps to create your own colourful Métis beadwork design.



Supplies Needed: Animal pattern, flower/ vines/fruit motifs, brightly coloured markers, scissors and glue

CTED 1

STEP 1

Choose your spirit animal pattern from the patterns provided.

You can fill in the pattern with a colour, or you can keep it white. Leave the tail, beard and hooves white.

STEP 2

Choose the flowers, leaves, vines and/or fruit patterns you want to use in your design.

Remember to select images that will mirror each other. Move them into a design that appeals to you – you can overlap, put flowers on animals, animals on flowers, etc.

STEP 3

Select the key colours you want to use from your markers.

Colour the flowers, leaves, vines or fruit patters you want to use in your design using your colours.

Cut out the images you coloured for use in your design.

STEP 4

Place your cut out flowers, vines, leaves and/ or fruits on your spirit animal images.

Remember to place them in a "symmetrical" or mirrored design.

STEP 5 Glue down your flowers, vines, leaves and/or fruits to finalize your design.

STEP 6

Use you're the coloured markers you used in your flowers to create multicoloured outlines inside the design of the animal's legs, tail, and beard/snout/nose.

First, use one colour to follow the inside of the design of each leg. The use another colour to follow the same outline inside the first one. Keep adding colours until you cannot fit in anymore.

STEP 7

Use one of your marker colours to highlight the outline of your spirit animal.
